



GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

Note to Exhibitors

All inquiries can be made to the Fair Secretary, Janice Lancaster by calling 705-647-4242 or by writing to P.O. Box 1239, New Liskeard, Ontario P0J 1P0. Email: nlfallfair@gmail.com

Exhibit tags are available by making arrangements prior to the fair with the secretary, Janice Lancaster, or can be picked up at the The Match Factory, Chat Noir Books, Temiskaming Vet Clinic, Northern Feed & Supplies, Breault Stock Farm at the Farmers' Market and Leis Landscaping & Country Store. They will also be available at the fair office (Horne Granite Centre Upstairs Room) on Monday, September 11, 2023 to Thursday, September 14, 2023.

Prize books are available from the Directors, The Match Factory, GEM Sewing, Chat Noir Books, Temiskaming Vet Clinic, Northern Feed & Supplies, North Cobalt Flea Market, Breault Stock Farm (at their booth at the Farmers' Market) and Leis Landscaping & Country Store. To offset costs, \$2.00 is requested for each book.

- Double check each section for entry deadlines. 1.
- 2. All recipients of trophies are asked to return the trophies to the Fair Office the week of the Fair, (September 11-17, 2023)
- 3. The 2023 membership fee of \$5.00 is necessary to exhibit at the Fair. This membership allows you to exhibit in any section from Livestock to Home Crafts. THIS MEMBERSHIP DOES NOT GRANT FREE ENTRY INTO THE FAIR GROUNDS.
- 4. If you earned over \$11.00 in 2022, your membership for 2023 will have been taken off your prize money and your 2023 membership card would have been issued with your 2022 prize cheque. If you are not yet a 2023 member your membership card will be issued upon receipt of your \$5.00 fee. Anyone entering exhibits without paying the membership fee will be disqualified and any prize money won will be awarded to the exhibitors who placed next in the prize rankings.
- 5. Seniors, Juniors and School Exhibitors do not pay the \$5.00 membership fee UNLESS they also enter any OPEN class or Livestock Class in the Fair, in which case the fee will be charged. If clarification is needed, contact Janice Lancaster or the Section Director.
- 6. Excluding group and livestock classes, an exhibitor's number will represent one person only and this person will retain the SAME number for as many years as he/she exhibits at the fair.
- Exhibits can be removed from the Riverside Place between 9:30am & 2pm on Sunday, September 17, 7. 2023. The School Exhibits located in the portables can be picked up on Sunday, September 17, 2023 from 9:00am to 1:00pm. Exhibits not picked up that day will be removed by the Fair Board. Exhibitors who cannot pick up their exhibits on Sunday must make alternative arrangements with the Director of the Section. We do not deliver. The Fair Board is not responsible for any damages or theft that may occur to the exhibits removed by the Board.
- Prize money earned in 2023 will be distributed at the Awards Banquet scheduled for Friday, October 8. 20, 2023 at the Riverside Place. If you cannot attend, your prize money (with membership for 2024 deducted) will be mailed to you AFTER the awards banquet. PLEASE NOTE: You must fill out your full mailing address on your entry forms to ensure your prize money can be mailed to you. No extraordinary measures will be taken to find exhibitors who do not provide contact information.
- 9. For issues of concern that arise before, during or after the Fair, please address them with the Section Director or contact the Fair Secretary.
- 10. Only the Director of a Section, in conjunction with the Secretary and President has the authority to change regulations for a class in that Section.
- 11. Any complaints regarding judging or classification must be made in writing to the Fair Secretary, c/o New Liskeard Agricultural Society, Box 1239, New Liskeard, ON P0J 1P0 accompanied by a cheque in the amount of \$25.00 within two weeks of the completion of the fair.

- 12. The Fair Board will not tolerate harassment of any volunteers or officials. Any proved harassment will result in all or any one of the following: a) ejection from the Fair Grounds; b) suspension of membership; c) permanent ban from exhibiting at the Fair. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 13. Please read any additional rules and regulations for each Section you enter.
- 14. Exhibitor Code of Practice:

- All animals will be treated with respect, regardless of whether they are for use in displays or livestock competitions. Mistreatment of animals will not be tolerated.

- The animals for exhibition will be prepared with proper training, fitting and grooming.

- The highest standards of nutrition, health and sanitation will be expected and consistent with the onfarm schedule. Soiled bedding shall be removed and fresh feed and water must be provided on a regular basis.

 At the discretion of the Director, any animals not in compliance with Fair husbandry standards and/or ill animals will be removed from the Exhibition. The Director may request immediate resolution of outstanding issues; assistance to resolve the aforementioned concerns is available as needed. Should Exhibitors fail to comply with the Fair animal husbandry standards, the Director has the authority to remove the animal from Exhibition. In addition, any animal(s) may be inspected by a veterinarian at the Director's request, and, pending consultation, removed at his/her discretion.
 Untrained individuals should not be allowed to handle livestock.

- Clean, safe, transport of animals to and from the Fair must be provided. Care will be used to minimize stress when loading and unloading animals.

- Consumption of alcoholic beverages on the Fairgrounds will only be tolerated in the New Liskeard Agricultural Society designated area.

- **15. Due to liability, no dogs will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except for** *Service dogs and those participating in the Dog Show.*
- 16. Limited parking (with permit) is available on the grounds for Livestock exhibitors and concessionaires.
- 17. Handicap parking is <u>NOT</u> available on the grounds. There will be limited handicap parking available in close proximity to the front gate.
- 18. All livestock, poultry, small animals and dog show exhibitors must sign a waiver of liability before they can participate in any of the classes being held. Waivers will be provided when exhibitors register at the main office.

Liability: All exhibits shall be under the control and direction of the New Liskeard Agricultural Society (NLAS) but solely at the risk of the exhibitor. The NLAS will not be responsible for damage, injury, loss or theft of or to any exhibit, irrespective of the cause of such damage, injury, loss or theft, whether such is caused by negligence or not. Each exhibitor will be solely responsible for any loss, injury or damage done to, occasioned by or arising from any article/animal exhibited by him/her and shall indemnify the NLAS against all legal or other proceedings in regard thereto.

A \$10.00 per class late entry fee will apply for entries received within the 1 hour post time limit.

DRAFT HORSE RULES

- 1. All exhibitors must register at the Fair office or by mail as stated above.
- 2. Please see Heavy Horse Director to receive your show numbers. These numbers will correspond to the horse being shown. All exhibitors MUST wear their CORRECT number when showing in the ring. Failure to comply with this rule will be strictly enforced.
- 3. If your entries are pre-registered and you are showing a team of draft horses at the fair, you will receive two weekend passes. Additional passes are available for helpers and workers at the rate of \$25.00 per pass. Every vehicle entering the grounds requires a parking pass. They can be purchased at the rate of \$20.00 per pass per vehicle. Passes are non-refundable. Entrance passes and parking passes can be ordered on your registration form. Exhibitors who do not pre-register will be required to pay the regular gate price to enter the Fair grounds.

All Draft Horses are to be in the barn by 12:00pm Friday of Fair week and remain in the barn as long as possible on Saturday.

- 4. All animals must be in good health. If there is concern regarding an animal's health status, a veterinarian will be consulted and the owners may be asked to remove them from the grounds.
- 5. Horses must have suitable halter and lead shank.
- 6. All handlers must be experienced and have a working knowledge of horses.
- 7. Coggins Tests are NOT required.
- 8. A CERTIFICATE SHOWING PROOF OF LIABILITY INSURANCE MUST ACCOMPANY THE REGISTRATION FORMS FOR ALL ANIMALS BEING EXHIBITED AT THE NEW LISKEARD FALL FAIR.
- 9. Rosettes will be given from 1st to 5th place. Prize money will be paid from 1st to 4th place (except for classes 17, and 21).
- 10. Junior Showmanship Class Draft Animals Only the exhibitor must be 18 years of age or younger.
- 11. There is no limit on the number of entries per class. CROSS ENTRIES ARE NOT ALLOWED except for classes 5 & 7. Line classes only.
- 12. The Load Draw will be judged under the rules and regulations implemented by the New Liskeard Agricultural Society. The Judge's decision is final in all disputes.
- 13. Draft horse exhibitors are to be cautious with the use of the whip in the area just outside the show ring.
- 14. In all classes, the light draft weight is 3400 lbs & under.
- 15. Stallions must be shown and/or handled by someone 18 years of age or older at all times. Draft horse director must be notified before entering grounds to make proper arrangements. Stallions are not permitted in barn (2 yrs. old and over).
- 16. While the directors and associate directors will take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of the animals, it is distinctly understood that owners must take the risk of exhibiting the animals and if any animal is injured, stolen or strays, the Directors will offer whatever assistance is in their power towards the recovery of the lost or strayed animal but

will make no payment in whole or in part for the value thereof. Directors or associate directors will not be held responsible for any accident on the Fair grounds.

DRAFT HORSE BARN RULES

- 1. Trailers and vehicles must be parked in designated areas <u>ONLY</u>. Please do not park in front of the barns.
- 2. No unauthorized persons will be allowed to remain in the barns overnight.
- 3. Absolutely NO SMOKING in the barns.
- Each exhibitor is responsible to keep his/her area tidy showing regard for other exhibitors and the general public. A bin will be provided for garbage.
- In the draft horse barn, exhibitors who previously built and maintained stalls will have first chance to use their stalls. Please see the Draft Horse Director for assignment of stalls. One bag of shavings will be donated by Leis Wood Products for each stall.
- 6. Exhibitors must provide their own feed, bedding and clean-up utensils.
- 7. A \$50.00 fine per stall will be imposed for stalls not cleaned out before the conclusion of the Fair on Saturday. The stall must be stripped clean and all hay and debris removed from the manger.

RING CONDUCT

- 1. Exhibitors may be disqualified for abusing horses in any manner, for abuse inside or outside of the ring or for using a whip.
- 2. During the line classes, horses must enter and leave the show ring at a walk, single file.
- 3. The equipment required for a class may not be used for practicing before the class or event begins unless authorized by the ring steward and Draft Horse Section Director.
- 4. In all timed events an electronic timer will be used whenever possible.
- 5. Failure to follow the course or pattern will result in disqualification. The judge's decision is final.
- 6. If an exhibitor leaves the ring during a class without the judge's permission, he/she will be disqualified.
- Exhibitors will be responsible for being on time for the class no late entries, no refunds and the class will not be repeated for anyone.
- 8. Exhibitors are to wait in the staging area after their class until the winners have been called or have someone ready to pick up their prize.

LIGHT HORSE GENERAL RULES

- 1. Exhibitors may enter two entries in each class, except in the showmanship classes, where only one entry is allowed.
- 2. ENTRY DEADLINE: All entries are to be registered by no later than Tuesday of Fair week. They can be mailed at the Fair office (located in the curling club) on Tuesday of Fair week. Show numbers will be given to the exhibitor prior to their event (please come into the Office approx. one hour before your show time to pick up your show #). A deposit of \$2 per number will be taken to ensure that all show numbers are returned once the exhibitor has finished showing.
- 3. If your entries are pre-registered and your entries total more than \$5.00 for the day you show, you will receive a pass for that day only. If your entries are pre-registered, and you are keeping your horse in the barn overnight and your entries for the weekend total more than \$10.00, you will be provided with one weekend pass. Extra passes are available for helpers, workers, etc. at the rate of \$25.00 per pass. Each vehicle requires a parking pass. They can purchased at the rate of \$20.00 per pass per vehicle. Please indicate on your registration form how many passes you require and enclose the amount with your registration fees.
- 4. Light Horse Barn Stalls are based on 1st registration with payment. Registrations for stalls can be made on the Light Horse Stall Rental form. Stalls are available at a cost of \$10 per stall, per night. Stalls are limited and overnight rentals take precedence over day time rentals. One bag of shavings is donated from Leis Wood Products for each stall rented. Only shavings are allowed for bedding and are the responsibility of the competitor.
- 5. Post entries will be accepted until one hour before the start of each division. Thereafter, a \$10 per class penalty will be added to the entry fees. *NOTE: ALL REGISTRATIONS WILL BE TAKEN IN THE FAIR OFFICE (LOCATED ON SITE WITHIN PARAMETERS OF THE GATES). NO REGISTRATIONS WILL BE TAKEN AT THE RING OR OVER THE PHONE!*
- 6. In line classes, prize money and points will be paid/awarded to the exhibitor/owner. In the riding classes, prize money and points will be paid/awarded to the rider. Separate entry forms and exhibitor numbers for line classes and riding classes are therefore required if the horse/pony show is not being handled or ridden by its owner.
- 7. Stallions must be shown and/or handled by someone 18 years of age or older at all times and may only be shown in saddle or harness classes (exception foal of current year and yearling).
- Animals must be in good health or, after consultation with a veterinarian, may be asked to leave the show.
- 9. All livestock must remain on the Fairgrounds until judging is completed in each respective class or the exhibitor will forfeit the prize money.
- 10. All horses and ponies must have a suitable halter and tie shank while on the Fairgrounds, and all horses and ponies must be halter broke and able to tie, for safety reasons.
- 11. While the Directors will take every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of the animals, it is distinctly understood that owners must take the risk of exhibiting the animals and if any animal is injured stolen or strays, the Director will offer whatever assistance is in their power towards the recovery of

the lost or strayed animal but will make no payment in whole or in part for the value thereof. The Director and Associate Directors will not be held responsible for any accident on the Fair grounds.

12. ALL ANIMALS SHOWN AT THE NEW LISKEARD FAIR MUST HAVE LIABILITY INSURANCE. Bring in a copy of insurance policy when doing entries so that we have it on file.

- 13. All western performances and western games will be judged as per the current year WHAO (Western Association of Ontario) rules. All English performances and hunter/jumper classes will be judged as per the current year Equine Canada (section R-G). New Liskeard Fall fair rules as to size, age, along with any other amendments will take precedence should the need arise.
- 14. The judge's decision is final. If an exhibitor has any questions they are to ask the Ring Steward to approach the judge on their behalf.
- 15. Judge's Notes in the absence of completion in any section or if an entry is of inferior quality the judge may award only such prize as they deem the entry worthy.
- 16. There must be at least two entries in a class for the class to run. If not, classes will be combined at the discretion of the Director.
- 17. All entries are asked to be ready at the gate and enter promptly when their numbers are called. The classes' order of go will be announced at the beginning of the class and/or posted in the warm up area. Competitors are asked to notify the announcer's booth of their intentions to scratch from a class prior to that class beginning.
- 18. In the event of a complaint, which cannot be settled by the Director, the exhibitor lodging the complaint must do so *IN WRITING* with a cheque for \$25.00 payable to the New Liskeard Agricultural Society within two weeks of the completion of the Fair.
- 19. A Coggins test will not be required.
- 20. All prize money will be paid by cheque at the awards Banquet, held in October. If you do not attend the Awards Banquet, your cheque will be mailed to you in early November.
- 21. Every year there is a stall decorating contest in the Light Horse Barn, *this years theme will be the Wizard of Oz. This competition is free to enter to all competitors renting a stall*
- 22. A beautiful rosette is awarded to the winner. Stall decorations must be securely fastened and safe for both horses and humans. No electrical decor, extension cords, lights, lamps or burning candles are permitted. Judging will be done Friday afternoon.

- 1. All animals shown at the New Liskeard Fall Fair must have liability insurance. A certificate of liability insurance must be provided with the registration form. Proof of insurance must be submitted with entry forms.
- 2. Only market animals born, raised and fed in North Eastern Ontario (Tem. North through Cochrane North District) and North Western Quebec (Temiskaming) are eligible.
- 3. You must own and have possession of market animal by April 30, 2023.
- 4. The Fair Board reserves the right to nose print all market animals if deemed necessary. The Director's decision is Final in any discrepancy.
- 5. Parking of trailers and vehicles: Parking in designated areas only. One parking pass is provided per farm unit for the market classes ONLY. Additional parking passes are available to purchase at the fair office.
- Market animal entry forms **MUST** be filled out and returned 6. to the Fair Secretary, Janice Lancaster at P.O. Box 1239, New Liskeard, ON POJ 1P0 by May 31, 2023 with an entry fee of \$5.00 per market animal to be show and the Ag Society membership fee of \$5.00. If an exhibitor's livestock entries are pre-registered and the exhibitor is keeping their livestock (of any species) in the barn overnight, each exhibitor is entitled to one (1) weekend pass to the Fair for one (1) livestock animal, registered in any given section. If an exhibitor has two (2) or more animals registered in one or more sections, the exhibitor is entitled to two (2) Weekend passes, regardless of section. Additional weekend Fair passes are available for helpers, workers, etc., at the standard rate of \$25.00. VEHICLE PASSES: Each vehicle requires a parking pass to enter the Fair grounds. - 11. Market animals must be dehorned, halter broken, clipped, and fitted to show standards. All entries are to be shown at halter in the show ring.
- 12. Market animals must be barn fed and finished to meet the approval of a Culling Committee.

- 13. Market animals will be trucked as a group to the slaughterhouse of the Committee's choice. Otherwise, trucking expenses will be the owner's responsibility or the buyers.
- 14. Slaughtering, cutting and wrapping costs will be the responsibility of the buyer.
- 15. Market animals will be weighed early Saturday morning prior to the Show. This weight will constitute as the selling weight less 2%, if deemed necessary.
- 16. Market animals will be judged in the Beef Ring at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 16, 2023 of the Fair.
- 17. The top 15 placing market animals will be sold by auction at 6:30 p.m. on Saturday in the order of their placing in Class #3 with the Grand Champion first.
- 18. To defray expenses involved in promoting and advertising this Show and Sale, exhibitors will be assessed a 5% commission.

An exhibitor acknowledges the Committee's right to randomly test any market animal and that if any illegal drug residue(s) are found, before or after slaughter, the Committee will not make payment to the Exhibitor for the market animal(s), and may take action to bar the Exhibitor from competing at future shows at the New Liskeard Fall Fair.
- 24. Unethical fitting of market animals entered for competition is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any treatment or operation materially altering the structure or the natural conformation of any part of the market animal's body such as the introduction of air, liquids, or other substances subcutaneous in any part of any act or operation to exaggerate the natural conformation of the market animal. Any market animal that, in the opinion of the Committee, has been unethically fitted shall forthwith be disqualified for exhibition and shall forfeit the right to be awarded any prize money and any entry fees that may have been paid to the Society on account of its entry shall be forfeited. The opinion of the Committee and any action that may be taken thereon may be reported to any association of which the exhibitor is known to be a member. Every exhibitor in consideration of his/her entry being accepted specifically undertakes that no market animal entered by him/her has been or will be before entering the judging ring, unethically fitted and he/ she agrees to submit for inspection before the Committee any market animal entered by him/her, at any time required and he/she further agrees that the opinion of the Committee shall be final and conclusive and without recourse against the New Liskeard Agricultural Society or any officer thereof, or any person appointed by the Executive to act in the matter in respect to any action which may be taken under the Rules as set herewith and he/she, by entering the market animal for exhibition, hereby releases the New Liskeard Agricultural Society from all claims and demands whatsoever in connection with disgualification of any market animal under the provisions of this section.
- 25. The giving of an oral injected diuretic or a growth stimulant not approved in Canada for Market Livestock constitutes

unethical fitting. NLAS reserves the right to collect urine or blood samples from any market animal for laboratory analysis. An exhibitor of a market animal having a quantity of diuretic or unapproved medication of any kind will forfeit all rights and privileges to exhibit at any future New Liskeard Fall Fair and forfeit any prize money earned by the present exhibition of the market animals(s) in question.

- All entries must be on the grounds by 9 pm, Wednesday of Fair week. LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. Entries will not be accepted after September 1, 2023. No exceptions. All entries will are cost \$1.00 per entry.


