6. One entry is allowed in each section.
7. All entries must be in place by $8: 30 \mathrm{am}$, Thursday morning of Fair week.
8. All entries must be grown by the exhibitor and must not have been shown previously at any other Fair or Exhibition.
9. All grains from classes 1 to 10 become the property of the New Liskeard Agricultural Society.

4. Fresh or real material unless otherwise stated.
5. For the information of the public it is urged that the exhibitor, where possible, include the variety name on the exhibitor tags.
6. PLANTS, FLOWERS, FRUITS AND VEGETABLES MUST BE IN PLACE FOR JUDGING BY 8:30 am THURSDAY MORNING
